Introduction

The Ankole Coffee Producers' Cooperative Union Ltd (ACPCU) is a 2nd grade organization supporting 17 Fairtrade certified primary cooperatives. They are based across the districts of Bushenyi, Mitooma, Rubiriizi, Sheema and Ntungamo in the fertile mountains of southwest Uganda.

There is a mixture of subsistence and commercial farmers in these multi-ethnic communities. Agriculture is the main source of income. With assistance from Cafédirect, they have organized into a strong Union. They have created job opportunities, involved women and youth in their activities, and developed skills and long-term peace in their communities. ACPCU members now manage their coffee from farm to export; by avoiding intermediaries, members can maximise their incomes.

Members also grow bananas, maize, sweet potatoes, and keep livestock, particularly cattle and goats. ACPCU supports farmers to practise sustainable farming, protect natural environments and manage natural resources.

Growing, processing and export

Producers harvest and dry their coffee at the farm, then deliver it to their primary cooperative. The primary cooperative is responsible for transporting the parchment to the Union's factory. The Union processes, grades, sorts and packs the coffee for export. The coffee is taken to a transportation centre and checked by officials. It is then transported to the port of Mombassa in Kenya for shipping.

ACPCU has an export license. The Union's coffee was ranked by Uganda Coffee Development Authority (UCDA) as the most compliant exporter of coffee in 2012/2013.

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Fairtrade

The Union is managed by a board of 5 people who are democratically elected by the farmers during the AGM (Annual General Meeting). There are 4 delegates from each primary cooperative at the AGM.

Environment: Climate change and coffee wilt disease

In an effort to confront coffee wilt disease, a number of primary cooperatives are investing Fairtrade Premium in growing new resistant seedlings and distributing them to members.

Quality and productivity

The Union has invested its Fairtrade Premium in a coffee nursery project so they can continue to grow seedlings and replace their current coffee trees with resistant varieties.

They have also invested in facilities for exporting washed Arabica coffee and fetch higher returns.

Local and cooperative infrastructure

The Union uses the Fairtrade Premium to make investments in warehouses, offices and coffee processing machinery for the cooperatives. They have also constructed ponds, bridges and schools.

Education

The Union has invested in education in the rural Nyakahita and Katenga communities by building schools.

Challenges

- Despite the steps to support farmers with resistant seedlings, production is still being affected by coffee wilt disease, locally known as *Toduura*.
- · ACPCU are still breaking through into organic markets.
